As we look back on 2017, a few numbers jump out at me...

- More than \$950,000 in grants were made to 78 nonprofit partners across 18 California counties to support projects that share voices, engage minds, and build bridges of understanding between us all
- 10 libraries participated in our pilot of the Library Innovation Lab to engage their immigrant communities
- 4 VA hospitals delivered the Literature & Medicine program to caregivers as a way to improve healthcare outcomes for veterans
 - Thousands of Californians benefited from public arts and humanities programs up and down the state

We know the numbers matter, but they only tell part of the story.

Think about young photographers visually documenting their experiences of transfronterizo life as they cross the San Diego border every day for work and gates project, and then baying experturities to exhibit and

school through another grantee project, and then having opportunities to exhibit and discuss the photographs with the public. Reflect on what young people learn when they rewrite Romeo and Juliet to fit their own community in Romeo is Bleeding, a documentary we supported that recognizes the power of words to transform lives.

During the year, we delivered our We Are the Humanities campaign to demonstrate how 34 prominent Californians from many different fields connect with the humanities through personal video stories on our website and social media, including author Isabel Allende, actor John Cho, and astrophysicist Dr. Jill Tarter. We also released our organizational video, narrated by former California Humanities board member and US Poet Laureate Juan Felipe Herrera, which tells the story of California Humanities, and asks "what is your California story?"

We have so much to look forward to in the coming year! More grant making, more public programs, more ideas and connections shared between people. With a renewed focus on K-12 and higher education, and how to engage all ages, we'll be launching new youth-focused projects in 2018 to hear the perspectives of California's young people. We hope you'll join us!

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Program Impact



The California Documentary Project (CDP) is a competitive grant program that supports high-quality humanities-based media projects that seek to document California in all its complexity. This year, \$400,000 was awarded to 14 projects through Research & Development and Production grants. In addition to multiple community and educational screenings and presentations, a number of CDP-funded projects were nationally-recognized for their quality. Documentary film The Force premiered at the 2017 Sundance Film Festival and won the U.S. Documentary Directing Award. National broadcast premieres included Ovarian Psycos and Real Boy on the PBS series Independent Lens, and Tribal Justice on POV. Dogtown Redemption, The Return, and No Mas Bebés received nominations for the 2017 National News and Documentary Emmy Awards.



Library Innovation Lab

The Library Innovation Lab provided training, support, and resources to a cohort of 10 programming librarians across the state to design and implement a new public humanities project over the course of this year. This project engaged their immigrant communities through a wide range of activities. Participating libraries developed creative and unique programs, strengthened ties to community partners, and contributed to welcoming new participants to their libraries.

Our goal was to present these individual stories in a way that exhibited the individuality of everyone's story while also shining a light on what we all share.

Humanities for All

Humanities for All, launched in fall 2016, supports locally-initiated public humanities projects that respond to the needs and interests of Californians, increase public participation in the humanities, and promote understanding and empathy among our state's diverse peoples in order to cultivate a thriving democracy. Through a two-tiered grants program (Quick Grants and Project Grants), \$554,710 was awarded to 64 projects during 2017, enabling thousands of people in communities across the entire state to have access to high quality, engaging, and thought-provoking programs.

The Art of Storytelling

The Art of Storytelling exhibit series celebrated California's rich cultural and artistic histories. We invited our local communities to our gallery space located in our Oakland office for three exhibits in 2017 featuring nationally-known local artist Favianna Rodriguez, youth artists from RYSE: Richmond Youth Raise Their Voices, and Mimi Plumb's photography documenting the California farmworker movement in the 1970s.



Screening of California Humanities - supported film Real Boy in Bakersfield

The Bakersfield College Social Justice Institute hosted a screening and panel discussion of the award-winning documentary Real Boy on March 16, 2017. The film, funded through the California Documentary Project grant from California Humanities, follows the story of a young transgender youth, Bennett Wallace, as he transitions gender to a "real boy." Over 100 people attended the screening and engaged in a community dialogue with California Humanities Senior Program Officer John Lightfoot, Real Boy director Shaleece Haas, and Jack Bockover from the Sexuality and Gender Awareness (S.A.G.A.) Club of Bakersfield College.

Literature & Medicine: Humanities at the Heart of Medicine®

Part of a national, award-winning, medical humanities initiative, this program brought together hospital staff and visiting scholar-facilitators to explore the human element of medicine. Through a series of reading, reflection, and conversation sessions over a group meal, the program invited care-givers to better understand and empathize with the experience of their patients – as well as their peers. This year, the program served over a hundred caregivers at Veterans Affairs health care centers in four locations: Fresno, Palo Alto, San Francisco, and Sacramento.

Stories of The 1/2% – Reconnecting Veterans to Themselves and Diverse Southern California Communities

Our long-standing Community Stories grant program, now replaced by Humanities for All, provided crucial funding to the Mindful Warrior Project, a veteran serving organization.

The project aimed to encourage other veterans to embrace and share their experiences, as well as to help bridge the gap between the 1/2% of the population who currently serve in the military and the rest of us. This project incorporated oral histories into a dramatic performance, which was performed by veterans.
